On Thursday 24 June 2010 we held the first Branch Council Meeting under the new constitution. The Annual General Meeting of Branch Council is charged with the responsibility to elect the twelve-person Executive Committee who will be responsible for guiding the management side of Scouting for the ensuing twelve months.

I am pleased to advise that Mr Craig Ray was elected as President of the Association and as President will also be charged with the responsibility of chairing the Executive Committee.

Craig has been involved in Scouting for a number of years. In recent times he has been a Scout Section Leader with the St John's Wood Scout Group and has also been the Executive Director of Brisbane Gang Show with the responsibility of chairing the Gang Show Executive Committee. Craig is no stranger to the Branch Executive table as he has served on this committee for many years.

Ryan Sodziak was elected as Secretary of the Branch and Myles Stanley who has served as the Honorary Treasurer for the Branch for a number of years was re-elected to that position.

The other members of the Branch Executive Committee are Mr Cliff Farmer OAM, Mr Daniel Caldwell, Mr Des Allen, Mr Gavin Brady, Ms Jean Clifford, Mr Ken Millers, Mr Phil McNicol and Mr Pieter Van Der Kamp.

Under the new constitution when a Chief Commissioner is appointed, that appointment also extends to membership of the Branch Executive Committee.

I believe that this is an exciting time for Queensland Branch as it gives us the opportunity to set some new directions, directions which are laid out for us in the 2020 Plan with the core objectives of the plan being;



To be a Movement which is sustainable by having adequate and committed volunteer Leaders and supporting Adults (COA)



To be a Movement which is sustainable by having adequate and committed financial and material resources (COB)



To be a Movement which delivers a dynamic, exciting and vibrant program (COC)



To be a Movement which has increasing Membership of young people with optimal retention (COD)



To be a Movement which has increasing participation of young adults in management, leadership and support (COE)



To be a Movement which is recognised by the whole community as the leading choice for the development of young people (COF)

The chartering of Scout Groups is embedded into the 2020 Plan and remains one of the major objectives of the Queensland Branch. One of the main reasons I hear Groups not being able to be chartered is the fact that they don't meet the Leadership requirements. Over the last twelve months we have had a concerted effort to promote the value of adults joining the Movement in Leadership roles and I am pleased to be able to report that during the last Scouting financial year our Leadership numbers increased by approximately 3% making it the fourth consecutive year that we have had such an increase. To ensure that this impetus continues we will over the next twelve months continue to heavily promote Leadership within the Movement and hopefully in March 2011 we will again see an increase in our Leader numbers.

Many of you will have heard me talk about the fact that Scouting doesn't have a recruitment problem as far as young people are concerned, that the real problem that we have is a retention problem. This has again proved the case during our last financial year. Whilst I understand that young people these days want to experience as much as they possibly can, swapping from one sport to another to gain that experience and also leaving Scouting in some cases, to go on to what they perceive is more challenging for them. Many of you will also heard me saying that I strongly believe that the retention of the young people in our training sections relies heavily on the quality of program which they receive. Whilst I don't believe that we will stop young people from going on to other challenges, our real challenge is to hold them within the Scout Movement for as long as we possibly can.

Until next month I wish you good Scouting and look forward to meeting you somewhere along the Scouting trail.

Application Forms

Our busy Administration team has been working hard processing the hundreds of application forms that we have received from around the State. Thanks to many that have filled in the application forms correctly sadly there are still loads that have information missing particularly Membership and Blue Card details.

This creates extra work and slows the process down significantly; we are unable to sort out Sub Camp Packs until all the information has been recorded.

Please be patient, as we will send out as soon as we can to each Pack, the Cub Scouts, Leaders and other helpers that will be attending, their Sub Camp allocation as well as the Pack's rostered time to arrive and depart.

Stanthorpe Temperatures

The temperatures in Stanthorpe are regularly 5-7 degrees cooler than Brisbane during the day and 7-9 degrees cooler overnight.

The mean temperature for September 2009 (according to Australian Bureau of Meteorology) ranged from approx 16°C - 21°C.

Warmth will be the most important thing for our Cub Scouts that are not used to the 'fresh' Stanthorpe temperature. Layers of clothing assist with maintaining core body temperature. This is better than one big bulky jumper, so long sleeve T-shirts, and under garments are the way to go.

Visitors' Day

Sunday 26 September will be the Open Day for the younger Cub Scouts, Joey Scouts and their Leaders as well as the opportunity for family members to come and visit Cuboree.

A registration form will be on the Cuboree website to indicate numbers and to assist us to monitor the visitors to and from the site.

The classic stereotype of a volunteer is someone who has lots of time to spare and is looking for something to do. Although this perception may have been true in the past when many women stayed out of the workplace and gave their energies to charity, the stereotype no longer fits. Women still volunteer more than men, and people between the ages of 35 and 44 are the likeliest to volunteer. Those members of the "likeliest group" also are likely to be balancing careers with raising families, not to mention taking care of aging parents, going to the gym, and keeping up with e-mail.

Volunteering

What does volunteering mean? The Oxford Dictionary has the following definitions:

1. a person who freely offers to take part in an enterprise or undertake a task
2. a person who works for an organisation without being paid

All Cub Scout Leaders are volunteers in Queensland and as such are defined by the above interpretation. Every member of the Association takes the Scout Law and Promise. Now where in the definition does it say they are not professional because they do not get paid, that they should only perform part of their job because they are not paid... get my drift! I am always disappointed to hear "Oh but I am only a volunteer so I can't be expected to do all the things that Cub Scout Leadership requires. I believe that whilst you are not paid a financial reward for the work undertaken there are a myriad of intrinsic rewards that you receive when you 'freely offer to take part' in Cub Scouting.

We work with a diverse range of families as unique as the location of our Groups, no two are the same and this always brings many challenges. There are many resources to help Cub Scout Leaders deal with the Cub Scouts and their families so please reach out to the District or Region advisors if you feel things are becoming unmanageable. There is nothing sadder than a Cub Scout that is so isolated that they lose their professionalism and Scouting philosophy.

Understanding why people volunteer is helpful in managing teams including the Cub Scout Leaders. Not everyone is motivated by the same factors. People volunteer for a variety of reasons, including their desire to

- Help the community and others
- Increase self-esteem
- Help out friends
- Make new friends
- Try out a job
- Polish their resumes
- Develop new skills
- Enjoy something they love

So think of this when you get together with your fellow Leaders, it may assist with how you develop your Pack management strategies.

Remember to visit Cuboree website as there is a Parents handbook (also very useful for Leaders) that is available for download. Have you joined our Cub Scout Leaders in Queensland Facebook Group – there are over 100 Cub Scout Leaders supporting each other by providing advice, ideas and activities.

Well done to everyone of you for doing such a great job in providing development of our most precious resource of all –Australia's Youth.

This year an effort was made to increase the size of the Camp sites to ensure the Patrols had plenty of room to setup. This was made easier due to the great shape that BP Park is in. This attributed to a safer and cleaner Campsite (until the winds started on Saturday). There was however some areas of concern from the camping team:

- Eskies were left in the sun and in a lot of cases with no ice and food floating in the water.
- Some Patrols didn't have meat in the Eskies but had items like chocolates, soft drinks etc Storing chicken or pork in an esky with minimal ice for 3 days is not advisable.
- Food not stored in suitable Containers.
- Some fry pans and cooking gear didn't appear to be used.

- Dirty plates stored in Patrol boxes. (or on tables or on the Ground) Stoves under the lower end of the fly and up on a table. (consider hot water and the small Scout, I have seen too many get burnt with hot water)
- Gas bottles still turned on.
- Some had rubbish bins but no lids.
- Rubbish bags still on site instead of disposing of them in the skip bins.
- Finally there is a concern on the size of some eskies and Patrol boxes, some twice the size they should be, we need to look at smaller ones that can be carried. Maybe we need to look at the Camping standards and come up with some suitable sizes of boxes and eskies.

None of this was in plague proportions but they are just simple things that shouldn't happen. Not observing these items lead to sickness and unfortunately a not so clean tent.

Thanks to all of the team who help put this together and all of the Scouts and Leaders that attended and participated through out the weekend. See you all next year.

GAME—NESW

If played indoors, one wall is specified as North. The other walls become East, South and West. When a direction is called, children must run to that wall. The last person to reach the wall is out.

To make it harder, you can call out any direction, eg. South West, East North East, or even 240 degrees (though don't expect them to be that accurate). You can also call out the direction where they already are - if they leave, the last one back is out.

One pair sent out with a whistle each. They must blow the whistle at least every 30 seconds. The aim is to avoid being caught by others. Once caught, everyone returns to a central area and another pair is chosen. Pairs may not split up.

Don't forget to define boundaries, time limits, and who will be up next (eg. pair who catch them).

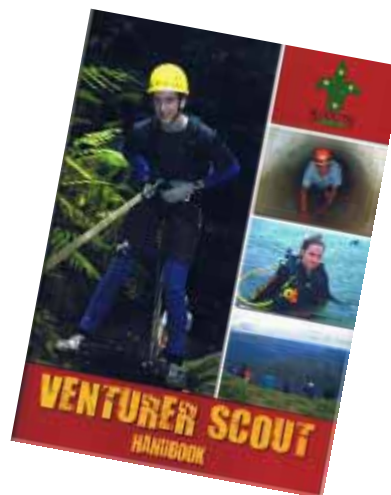


YOUNG ENDEAVOUR ADVENTURE

Warwick State High School student, Youth Ambassador and Venturer Scout Michael See has just returned from a ten day voyage on the Young Endeavour. Michael applied for a voyage and was selected to sail from Newcastle to Brisbane. The ship was a gift to Australia from the United Kingdom for the 1988 Bicentenary.

Michael learned how to be a crew member on the square rigged sailing ship. The highlight was when the 22 member youth crew sailed the ship for a 24 hour period without assistance from the Royal Australian Navy permanent crew. A particular highlight was tacking the ship at 2.30 am in the morning. The youth crew captain described the pride and accomplishment of the crew when they completed this task.

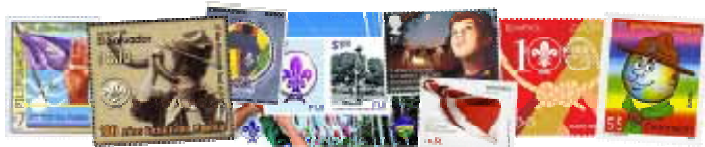
Scout International Student Exchange Program (SISEP)

Frank was saying his prayers as he went to bed. He was nearly four years old. "Please, dear God, give me a new bike for my birthday", he prayed.

"Frank, you shouldn't ask God for a bike", said his older brother Gary. "It's wrong, isn't it, Mum, to ask God for things like that?"

"Well, Gary, if you wanted a bike very much, would you speak with me and dad about it?"

"Yes, I suppose so", said Gary. "But that's different!"

"Really, Gary, it's not that different, you know. God is our heavenly Father. When we pray to him, we can speak to him like a father. He tells us: *"Pray at all times"*. We can tell him how we feel. We can ask him for things we need, and tell him about things we would like to have. But we should remember that there are some things that we **need** for our daily life; other things we might like to have but don't really need. When we ask for that kind of thing, we always leave it to God whether he will give it to us or not. As God's children, we will try to ask for things which are good for us and for others. It would be wrong for us to ask for something which would do us or other people harm, or if we are just greedy."

"Will God hear Frank's prayer and give him a bike?" asked Gary. "God always hears our prayers. He always answers them. But sometimes when we ask for this kind of thing, his answer may not be just what we ask for, because our heavenly Father knows what is best for us. He answers our prayers in the way he knows will be good for us."

"Sometimes God may say No to us, because he knows it would only hurt us – as I would if I gave Frank a knife to play with. Sometimes God says: 'I will give you this instead; it is better for you' – as I do when I give Frank his toy to play with. Sometimes God says: 'Wait a while; you are not ready for it yet'. But God does answer us, just as he promises."

Here are some things that you can pray for:

- Thank God for your family.
- Ask for God to forgive you for some wrong that you have done.
- Thank God for all the things he has done for you – your food, clothes and everything that you need.
- Ask God for something that you need.

A little activity that you could use in your section: (This may take a few nights)

- Construct a tree out of dead branches that you might gather from your garden.
- Using a sheet of cardboard, cut out some leaf shapes – one for each of the members of your section.
- Ask your youth members to decorate one side of their leaf.
- Ask each youth member to write, on the other side of their leaf, something that they could thank God for or ask God for.
- Using a piece of string, attach these leaves to your tree.

You now have a prayer tree which you can go back to over and over again – using the prayers already inscribed to enrich the spiritual life of both yourself and those in your section.

Good luck and have some fun while you are doing the activity.

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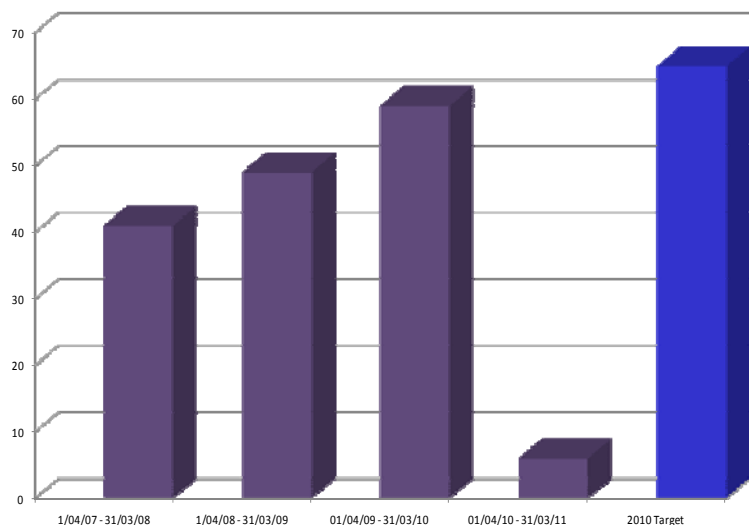

JULY 1910—PATROL LEADERS APPOINTMENT

July 1910 saw a big increase in the number of youth members of the Kangaroo Point Troop and the appointment of new Patrol Leaders and Seconds was a priority.

The method of appointment required the candidates to sit a written examination which was held in the study of the Chief Scoutmaster, C.S. Snow's residence at Kangaroo Point. The examination consisted of written questions on Scout work in general followed by an examination in Troop/Patrol management.

The prospective Patrol Leaders were required to show their skills in running activities with the other candidates acting as their patrol. Those who acquired the highest marks were appointed. Two of those appointed at this time were Patrol Leaders Roy Ferguson and Les Slaughter.

THE BIG DESPATCH RUN

On the 30th July 1910 the first big combined Scouting activity was the dispatch run from Brisbane to Ipswich. It was in effect a big relay race with two teams competing. The run was organized by Scoutmaster Reverend J. C. Milliken with the help of other Scoutmasters.

The run was to take a message from Brisbane to Ipswich in the shortest time.

The start was the "Courier" (the forerunner to the Courier Mail) building on the corner of Queen and Edward Street in Brisbane and the runners proceeded along Queen Street to Stanley Street (Southbank), Boggo Road (Annerley Road), Ipswich Road through Moorooka and Rocklea. When the runners reached Wacol the despatches were transferred to Scouts on bicycles under the control of Scoutmaster Leonard Lovejoy.

At Riverview the Ipswich Scouts received the despatches and they were conveyed, once again by runners, to Ipswich where they were received and signed by the Mayor of Ipswich Alderman M. Bowers.

The distance of the run was 25 miles (40 Km) which the relay covered in 2 hours 26 minutes. The difference between the arrival of the A and B teams was 1.75 minutes.

250 Scouts from Kangaroo Point, Toowong, North Brisbane, New Farm, Woolloowin, Clayfield, Ashgrove, Red Hill, Kelvin Grove, Woolloongabba, Wynnum, Sandgate, Ipswich, Milton and South Brisbane took part.

SCARF AND WOGGLE HOLDER

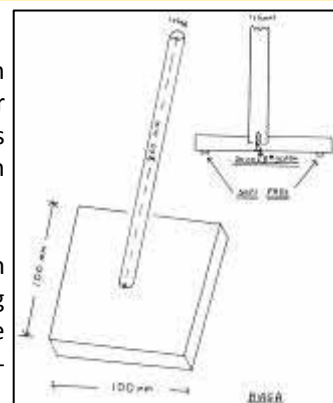
Sick and tired of *not* being able to find your Woggle in a hurry? Does your Scarf look like the dog's been playing with it? Looking for a little project for your Patrol or just yourself? This could be just the thing for you. It is a simple to make Scarf and Woggle holder that is easy to make but looks great when finished. Imagine how pleased you will be with your Woggle collection on display and neat and tidy!



You just need a little bit of scrap timber (100 x 100 x 20mm), a piece of 15 mm dowel, 1 x 20mm wood screw and some soft pads on the base to stop it scratching your fine furniture. Just cut the base into the correct size and drill a small hole halfway through for the dowel. Insert the dowel and glue and screw from the bottom. Glue on some soft felt and –finished!

Of course you could always dress it up a bit. If you know someone with a router you could ask them to put a fancy edge on the base and some clear lacquer or stain would really make it flash. How about Patrol colours? Give it a go!

MAKE A PIZZA BOX SOLAR OVEN!

This solar oven has been adapted from many designs. Please feel free to improvise! The pizza box solar oven can reach temperatures of 275 degrees, hot enough to cook food and to kill germs in water. A general rule for cooking in a solar oven is to get the food in early and don't worry about overcooking. Expect the cooking time to take about twice as long as conventional methods, and allow about one half hour to preheat.

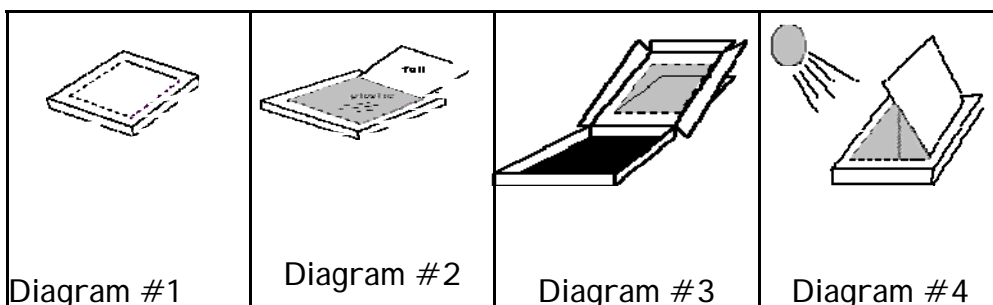
What You'll Need

- Recycled pizza box
- Black construction paper
- Aluminum foil
- Clear plastic (heavy plastic works best)
- Non-toxic glue, tape, scissors, ruler, magic marker
- Wooden dowel or straw

How to Make Your Pizza Box Oven

1. Draw a 2.5cm border on all four sides of the top of the pizza box. Cut along three sides leaving the line along the back of the box uncut. (Diagram #1)
2. Form a flap by gently folding back along the uncut line to form a crease. (Diagram #2) Cut a piece of aluminium foil to fit on the inside of the flap. Smooth out any wrinkles and glue into place. Measure a piece of plastic to fit over the opening you created by forming the flap in your pizza box. The plastic should be cut larger than the opening so that it can be taped to the underside of the flap. Be sure the plastic becomes a tightly sealed window so that the air cannot escape from the oven interior.
3. Cut another piece of aluminium foil to line the bottom of the pizza box and carefully glue into place. Cover the aluminium foil with a piece of black construction paper and tape into place. (Diagram #3)
4. Close the pizza box top (window), and prop open the flap of the box with a wooden dowel, straw, or other device and face towards the sun. (Diagram #4) Adjust until the aluminium reflects the maximum sunlight through the window into the oven interior.

Your oven is ready! You can try heating pizzas, or hot dogs, or even try baking cookies or biscuits. Test how hot your oven can get using a simple oven thermometer!

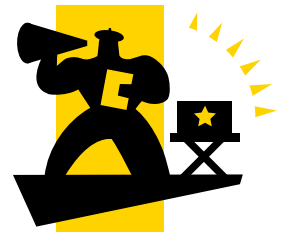
With your Patrol, choose a craft that you would like to try. Each member should use the craft to make two gifts to give to special people.

- Show the movie to the rest of the Troop and/or Cub Scout Pack.



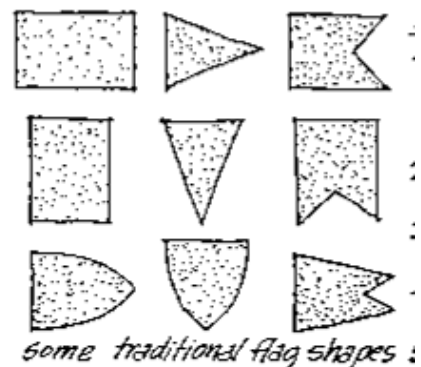

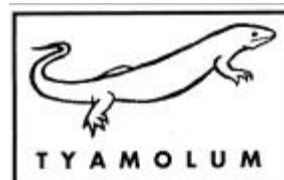
