# Chief Commissioner

In this month's edition of Encompass we announce the people who received Adult Recognition Awards which were announced by the Governor-General and the Chief Scout of Australia on 1 August.

Whilst I have written personally to each of these people I would like to place on the public record my congratulations and on behalf of Scouting a very, very sincere thank you for the contribution which you have made to the Movement.

This is also an opportune time to make some comments in relation to the Adult Recognition Awards in an effort to try to lay to rest some of the misunderstandings that exist within the Movement.

Adult Recognition Awards are not Long Service Awards. The Long Service Awards are an award that is issued at increments of five years and is an automatic award which does not require anyone to nominate the person for the award. In fact the producing of the Long Service Awards is an automatic process in our computer system and it has been developed in this way to ensure that our Members receive recognition for the length of service they have given to the Movement in a timely manner.

The Adult Recognition Awards, on the other hand, are not an award for length of service; they are an award which recognises the quality of service over and above the role to which a person is appointed. Whilst there is a guideline in relation to each level of Adult Recognition Awards that talks about a period of service, this is a guideline only and is not meant to imply that the award will be bestowed upon a person within that length of service category.

On the contrary the person must be nominated for an award and that nomination includes a citation which must include information on what the person has done over and above what is expected of any appointment which they may have held.

The nomination for an award may be submitted by any Member and must be submitted through the Branch Headquarters. It is normal for the Queensland Branch to call for nominations for Adult Recognition Awards on an annual basis and a posting in relation to the nominations being open is posted on our website. This posting on our website will also include the date by which the nomination has to be received at Branch Headquarters.

We often hear comments about people being overlooked in the award recognition system and this is indeed a shame for we need to recognise appropriately, the service, other than length of service, which our Leaders and Supporters give to the Movement. With anybody in the Movement being able to submit a nomination there is no reason why anybody who is making an appropriate contribution to the Movement should not be nominated. I would at this stage suggest that it is not appropriate for one member of the family to submit an award nomination for another member of the family and we have seen instances where family members have nominated each other.

The other misconception is that the Chief Commissioner is the person who decides whether or not someone receives an Adult Recognition Award. This is not the case. In Queensland we have an Adult Recognition Awards panel and that panel looks at all the award nominations received at Branch Headquarters and makes a recommendation to the Chief Commissioner as to whether or not the nomination should be considered or the level of the award which should be considered.

The Chief Commissioner may make an award of a Certificate of Merit, a Silver Arrowhead, a Silver Wattle or Outstanding Service Award however this has to be notified to National Headquarters and comes under the scrutiny of the Chief Commissioner of Australia as the award is eventually made by the Governor-General and Chief Scout of Australia. All other awards must be recommended to the Chief Commissioner of Australia who may or may not accept that recommendation for on-forwarding to the Chief Scout of Australia.

Adult Recognition Awards in Australia are announced on the 1 August each year and presentation ceremonies are run in each of the Branches normally timed so that the person is presented with their award as soon as possible after the announcement has been made.

I trust that this has clarified some of the misnomers in relation to Adult Recognition Awards system and that each and every one of you will next year, when nominations are called for, give consideration to the Leaders and Supporters with whom you work and if you deem appropriate, submit a nomination for an Adult Recognition Award.

Until next month I wish you good Scouting and I look forward to the time that I will see somewhere along the Scouting trail.

## SKIN THE SNAKE RELAY

Divide into two teams. Hold hands front to back - reach one hand forward and the other back between your legs to grasp the extended hand of the person behind. Leader stand at front of line and on command place a hoop over the head of the first in line; the team is to work hoop to the back of the line.

Add more hoops to each line so that two, three or more hoops are being worked down each line. When hoop gets to end of line, the last Joey Scout runs to the front of the line, grabs the hand of the person at front, who is now second, and starts the hoop moving down the line again.

## PAIR TAG

Allocate pairs. This is a tag game where Joey Scouts can only tag their allocated partner. No running is allowed, only fast walking. Split the pairs and have scattered around the hall. If you are tagged you must clap your hands three times before you move off to try and catch your partner. (Make sure Joey Scouts are evenly

## CAPTAIN'S COMING

Signs on walls for Bow, Stern, Port, Starboard. When the following are called, Joey Scouts are to carry out appropriate actions:

- Bow – Run to front of boat
- Starboard – Run to right side
- Port – Run to left side
- Stern – Run to back
- Captain's coming – stand and salute
- Crow's next – All in centre together
- Climb the rigging – Climbing ladder action
- Man overboard – Pretend to swim
- Man the Life Boards – Sitting in pairs, pretending to row

## CRAFT: BALLOON BOATS

### MATERIALS:

- Styrofoam meat trays
- Balloons
- Water proof markers
- Wading pool filled with water



### DIRECTIONS:

- Decorate the meat trays with the markers
- Make a hole in the centre of the tray
- Insert the lip of the balloon through the hole.
- Blow up the balloon from the under side of the boat and tie the end with a knot.
- (The boat will float and can be directed through the water by blowing on the balloon. It can also be jet propelled by releasing the balloon's knot; the escaping air will power the craft.)

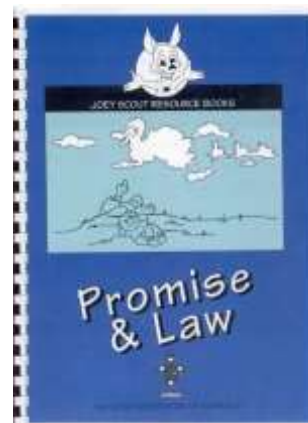

Every year we lose many Cub Scouts from their Scouting journey, for some its competing factors like sports or hobbies that consume the Youth Members time, for some it's a domestic consideration but sadly for many there is a lack of knowledge that there is a Scouting option for them more than the three years in the Cub Scout Section.

Many Groups don't hold effective Group Councils or regular interaction between the Sections, many Sections work totally in isolation rather than supporting each other and this is reflected in the linking issues we are seeing around the State.

As Cub Scout Leaders you can invite your Joey Scouts, Troop Leaders, Patrol Leaders and other Scouts to be part of the Cub Scout Section via shared activities, guest appearance, special nights, this allows the Youth Members to get to know the other Section members and is more welcoming for them when they arrive on their first Pack or Troop night.

Linking belongs to all of us – it's not a Sectional concern only, if we truly believe that Cub Scouting is important in the development of our Youth then we owe them to ensure their journey does not stop when they leave our Section. There is nothing more inspiring than to hear your Scouting 'name' called out as you walk down the street by one of your 'old' Cub Scouts now well and truly moved on from Cub Scouts. This is the reward of your 'volunteering' – please take some time to think about your linking processes. My team will be reflecting on linking as part of our 2020 plan to see what tools, tips and resources we can provide to support the Cub Scout Leaders.

Now that we are more than half way through this 2010 year how is your forward planning going – remember FAIL to PLAN, PLAN to FAIL. Enjoy your Cub Scouts and remember that they really do appreciate your support and guidance.

## CUB SCOUTS ON THE RIGHT TRACK

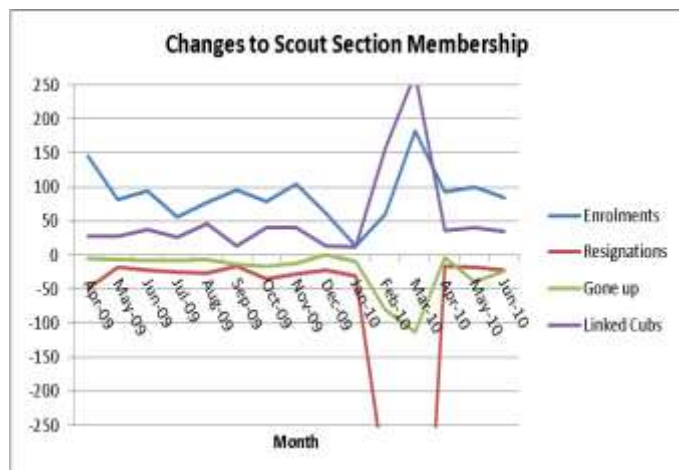




I'm sure that we've all heard of Troops that are increasing their membership through fantastic recruitment efforts. There is also a badge to acknowledge Groups that have reached a target level and congratulations to those Groups who have recently received them. You may also have heard that as a Section and indeed as a movement we don't have a recruiting problem, we have a retention problem. While being aware of this issue, its magnitude eluded me until I recently had the opportunity to review some statistics. In the Scout Section for the last Scouting year:

- We managed to recruit 1050 new Scouts into the movement
- Of the approximate 3000 Scouts we had, only 271 linked up to Venturers
- We had 708 Cub Scouts advance into the Scout Section
- We **LOST 1378 Scouts, 47% of our Section resigned**

Wow!! All that great work by so many people is undone in the last line. To better understand this data it can be looked at over the year to see if there are any trends.



The first obvious one is that March is a big month for administration catch up. In February there were some massive losses due to resignations as well as sharp increases in the movement of Scouts up to Venturers. This can be attributed to it being a Jamboree phenomena but it could also be that Scouts are a little bit like lemmings. Once a year they all plunge off the 'cliff' into Venturers. There were also some big gains from Cub Scouts so there may be a bit of lemming in them too. I will look into past years to see what the trends are when it wasn't a Jamboree year and let you know in next months encompass. For the rest of the year the trends were fairly static.

So is this all just the rambling of a madman or is there a point to these statistics? Hopefully I've been able to highlight some areas in the Scout Section where we can do a little better to grow

#### Retain our new enrolments and existing Scouts by

- Having an active, exciting and engaging program
- Progressively developing the leadership role of a Scout as the move through the Section
- Being active in finding out why we are losing so many Scouts.
- Do you or your GL carry out an exit survey?
- Welcoming parents into the Group

#### Link more Scouts to Venturer Scouts by.

- Getting to know your Venturer Scout Unit or a nearby Unit if you don't have one
- Identifying when a Scout is ready to move on and being prepared to cut the apron strings.
- Don't hang on to them because they are a good PL or you will have to train another.
- Don't have senior PL's – its time to move on.

#### Assist Cub Scouts in linking in by

- Visiting Cub Scouts so that they get to know you.
- Do a joint activity
- Having PL's visit Cub Scouts and run a game or activity every now and then. They could tell the Cub Scouts about some of the Scout activities, show them photos or videos of some of the events.
- Carry out the linking process properly so that they achieve their Scout Craft badge upon entering the Troop
- Carefully match the Cub Scouts with the right Patrol at your Troop Councils.

I'd like the Scout Section as a whole to accept the challenge of doing something about our retention problem. Talk with your PL's in your Troop Councils and find out their ideas on the problems and formulate a strategy to address the issues above. Let me know any great ideas that you come up with so I can share them. To work together towards this we must have a shared goal and it must be measurable. Some suggestions are that by this time next year our growth rate will be 20%; or the Scout Section membership will be higher than Cub Scouts; or 50% of our Scouts will link up to Venturer Scouts. Please let me know your thoughts for a goal by email.

As Scout Section Leaders we share a special relationship with the youth we work with. At times we are seen as a close friend and at others we are an authority figure. Most of the time we are in the blur somewhere in between and it is our Scout Craft (or Wood Craft) name that represents this position. It's a nickname that the Scouts call us by whilst maintaining a certain level of formality and not using our first names. In return as Leaders we must respect this position and walk a narrow path. We must bear in mind that Scouts are still children or adolescents and ensure that we communicate at an appropriate level for their age.

At SSS a Scout had her pocket knife confiscated for mishandling it by an unknown Leader. This pocket knife had significant value to the Scout and her family and I would appreciate it if the Leader could please mail it to Branch HQ marked to my attention so that it can be returned to the family. There are also still several bags of lost property from SSS and if no claims are made it will be donated to Lifeline at the end of the month.

## INITIATIVE ACTIVITIES FOR VENTURERS

**Try some of these with your unit.**

1. You are confronted by another river to cross. You elect a team leader. He works out the solution. There is a speechless human, one duck, one fox, one dog, one cat and a canoe to get you all across the river. The problem is the canoe can only carry two characters. The dog or the fox cannot be left with the duck. The dog cannot be left alone with the cat.
2. An imaginary river running across in front of you. You are an advanced scouting party and your job is to make the track safe for everyone following. The river is a fast flowing river, with the famous jumping crocodiles swarming within it. Your task is to construct a bridge without a rope or any other material other than that provided, across the river. The bridge must be at least 75cms above the water line, for these crocodiles can jump up to 60cms in the air. No-one is allowed to enter the river for they will be swept away. All the poles you will need are on the bank of the river.

3. A powerful exercise for learning how to work together, communicate and seek to improve performance in medium sized groups.

- Randomly lay out up to 30 numbered markers or spots in a set area. This forms the keypad.
- Create a starting/finish point up to 10 yards beyond the set area- the group must assemble here-hence they do not have clear view of the keypad either before the first attempt or in between attempts.
- The group must touch all the numbered spots as fast as they can. The team is given five attempts and must complete all attempts within a 30 minute window, whilst seeking to A/ complete the task and B/ if possible better their time. The group is penalized when a number is touched out of order and if more than one person is inside the boundary of the set area. The penalty may be, for example, that the group must start the attempt again but the time keeps ticking for that attempt.
- Give the team 5 minutes to plan, then begin the 30 minutes count down, and then start the timer for the first attempt. Time each attempt when they say they are ready to begin the next one.





## URBAN CHALLENGE 2010 – Where's Wally

This year's Urban Challenge was a huge success. 161 Venturer's participated in 34 teams with 60 Rovers/Venturer Leaders running bases, roadblocks and organising the event. Urban Challenge is a wide-game in and around the Greater Brisbane region. Run by Queensland Rovers for the Venturer Scout Section the weekend is designed around a series of Challenges including a scavenger and activity base hunt across the Translink public transport network on Saturday and a day of photo challenges, tasks and activities around Brisbane City CBD on Sunday. A big thank you to the organising crew St John's Wood and all of the other Rovers who assisted to make this a fantastic activity.

The past month has been a very busy one in SISEP land our visitors from Denmark and England have been very busy doing various scouting activities around the place.

The Danes arrived in two groups at the end of June. A couple were on their way to the Qld Venture as well as a couple in the second group that arrived on the 1<sup>st</sup> July. From all accounts, the four Danish girls had a fantastic time at Qld Venture and they made lots of new friends. Our final visitor from the UK arrived on the 15<sup>th</sup> July and will be here till early September.

Some stories from the Host Families are copied below:

"Cathrine has made many friends at Venture, and met up with some of them again at Gang Show last Saturday night. On the way to Gang Show we did the Mt Cootha tour, all of the girls have commented on our 'mountains' as Denmark is flat. Sunday we went to the Southbank precinct, did the markets, and many photos of the city were taken. Cathrine is from a small town in Denmark and has only been to Copenhagen twice, so the concept of a big city is amazing to her. Monday we set off on a trip to Lightning Ridge. Cathrine wanted to buy her mum an opal, so where better!! Travelling the distances was humorous; Cathrine has visited Australia before so was used to the distances, however she hadn't travelled so far in one day...750km. We saw emu and kangaroos on the side of the road (both dead and alive!!), again she was amazed by the range at Cunningham's gap. At Lightning Ridge, we took a bus trip of the town, visiting some of the local sites; venturing down a mine, seeing the astronomers monument (which had a Danish flag flying!!); fossicking for opal; and learning some facts about opal and the town's history. "

"Thomas has settled in well. We have been to various scenic areas around Warwick and Killarney. We climbed Mt Cordeaux at Cunningham's Gap last Sunday. He has also played A grade hockey with both of my boys and has been a great addition to the team. Thomas (and Casper) are both attending all of Michael's classes at the Warwick State High School. Thomas seems to be enjoying it. Thomas and Casper also attended Cubs and Joeys last night and will be at Venturers tonight."

"We went to visitors day at QV (disappointed that there was no planned activities for visitors). We left Nemo with the other Danish girls for a couple of hours and they played Danish music very loud and then played a Danish game called pløk, hard to explain, easy to play. We have been to the Sunshine Coast, spent a day in the City and Fortitude Valley, climbed the Glasshouse Mountains, this weekend we are going to Australia Zoo and the Venturer Scouts are going to Urban Challenge. it has been hard for Nemo to get used to wearing a school uniform as the schools are more relaxed in Denmark. Nemo and Rachel went horse riding and Nemo was thrilled to ride faster than she ever has in Denmark."

"Casper is having fun and has settled in very well, he has become one of the family . We have taken him to feed Aussie parrots at Queen Mary falls and he has settled into school. We are heading down to Bald Rock this Sunday for a barbeque and a hike , the Scout Shop at Toowoomba on Saturday to meet some of the staff down there especially Joyce . He has seen the Japanese Gardens in Toowoomba and has visited that City twice since his arrival , this will be his third trip there . 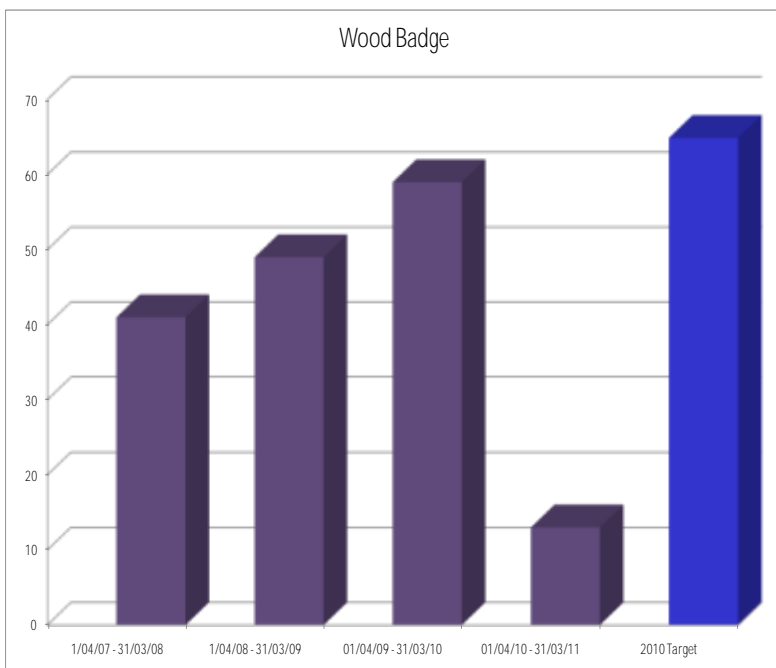

## AUGUST 1910—EXHIBITION DISPLAY

August each year in Brisbane heralds in the Exhibition and, usually, the cold westerly winds. Queensland Branch is gearing up for this years Scouting display at the Exhibition as was the Branch in 1910.

All through June 1910 preparations were made for the first public rally to be held during the annual "Exhibition" in August. Responsibility for various activities was allocated to a number of Scoutmasters.

The display was on Children's Day, Saturday August the 6<sup>th</sup> 1910. There were 350

Scouts taking part. The double lock 40 foot bridge was a feature and was crossed by the Governor of Queensland Sir William McGregor and Lady McGregor.

Other items in the display were ambulance, first aid and a bicycle Patrol ambulance. A flagstaff of Scouts' staves was erected with the Union Jack on it. There was signaling, also tracking, scouting and the erection of bush huts.



After the display the Scouts marched around and out of the ring with flags flying and the bugle band playing and to the cheers of the spectators.

## SAILBOAT CARD FOR FATHER'S DAY

*"I'd sail the seven seas for you, Daddy!" or "I'd sail the seven seas for you, Grandpa!"*

You can glue this to the front of a construction paper card or as a "gift tag" on a wrapped present. The bottom of the boat unfolds to reveal a hidden message



### INSTRUCTIONS

- Have the child trace a small plate (dessert plate) on a piece of construction paper.
- Cut out the circle (adult assistance may be required).
  - Fold the circle in half.
- A message can be written inside.
- On the outside, write, "I'd sail the seven seas for you, Daddy!"
- Have the child cut a long strip of black construction paper (or use a popsicle stick) for the mast

Make the sails one of two ways:

- make a two fingerprint handprints on contrasting colored construction paper. Cut out a rough triangle shape around the handprints OR Trace two hands onto a piece of construction paper. Cut out and glue to a contrasting triangle of construction paper

## FATHERS DAY GAMES: HANDPRINT/ FOOTPRINT I.D. GAME

Place the child's hand/ foot print on a piece of paper and label the top with their name. Then cover up the name with a flap of paper and hang these on the wall. During the party you ask the father's to identify their child's print. Then reveal to everyone whose print is whose. This is harder then it sounds!



## FATHERS DAY GAME: TIE MATCHING GAME

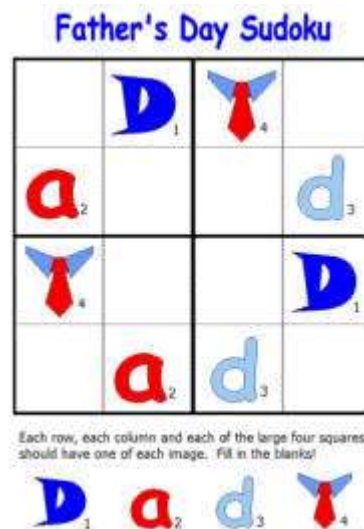
Have the dads in your class donate old ties. Cut two three inch section off of each tie (save the rest of the ties for a collage). Glue each piece of tie to a large index card or piece of cardboard. Have the children match the ties together.

# Program Ideas

## FATHERS DAY COUPON BOX

### What you'll need:

- Empty round container (ie: Crunchies can, Nut can, etc.)
- Construction paper (variety of colors)
- Crayons
- Pen
- Googly eyes
- Tape
- Glue
- Scissors



### How to make your Father's Day Coupon Box:

- Cut out a strip of blue construction paper and tape or glue it to the container. (We found that a single sheet wasn't big enough for our container and taped two pieces of paper together first and then cut out our strip.)
- Cut out a wavy, thinner strip of brown construction paper to glue to the bottom of the container (the whole way around) to look like sand at the bottom of the ocean.
- Add construction paper decorations or use crayons and have your kids draw on fish, seaweed, etc.
- Use a crayon to write "Happy Father's Day" on your fish container.
- Cut out fish from construction paper. Add a googly eye and a smile to each fish.
- On each fish, write something special (a chore or activity) that the child could do for dad. Ideas for young children would be things like "give dad a hug" or "bring dad a snack" whereas older children could write things like "take out the trash" or "mow the lawn". Have your children help you come up with the ideas to make the gift even more special!



Place the fish in the container and put the lid on top.

## ROCK FAMILY PLAQUE

### What you'll need:

- Wood plaque
- Rocks, one for each family member
- Wiggle eyes, 2 for each rock
- Black acrylic paint
- Acrylic sealer spray
- Paintbrush
- White craft glue
- Label maker or silver paint and a black marker



### How to make it:

1. Paint the wood plaque with a coat of black paint and let dry. (See photo.)
2. Wash the rocks and let them dry.
3. Paint a second coat of black paint on the plaque and let dry.
4. Have an adult spray the plaque with a coat of acrylic sealer spray.
5. Let dry.
6. Position rocks on the table and find the "resting spot" on the rock so that they will sit solidly on your plaque.
7. Glue wiggle eyes on to the rocks, using a generous amount of glue. The glue will dry clear. Let dry.
8. Position rocks on the plaque, then add a generous amount of white glue to the bottom of each rock and gently press onto the plaque. Let dry completely.
9. Use a label maker to create your family name. If you don't have a label maker, paint a strip on the plaque with silver paint. Let dry completely.
10. When strip is dry, use a black marker to write your family name.

## BEST EVER BARBEQUE APRON

Add a few splashes of fabric paint to a plain canvas apron, and what do you get? A gorgeous kid creation that will artfully shield Dad's clothes from that messy grill.

### Materials

- White canvas apron, in Dad's size, available at craft stores
- Masking tape
- Fabric paints of different colors
- Paintbrushes

### Instructions

1. Prewash the apron. Mark off sections of the apron with masking tape, so each child artist gets his or her own tableau.
2. Kids can sketch out ideas on paper beforehand or go straight to canvas. Themes might include food on the grill, family self-portraits, or Dad's favorite things. Remove the tape and set the paint according to the manufacturer's directions

Over the next few months I thought that I might take you on a journey through some of the major religious traditions of the world. I do this because we may have in our Groups, members from other religious traditions which will give us the opportunity to enrich our own spiritual lives if we have a basic understanding of their religious heritage. I begin with Christianity.

Christianity is founded upon the belief that at one time in human history, God became man: it was God the Son, Jesus Christ who was born a child of the Virgin Mary, thus He is truly Man. He came to save humankind from sin, and to give through what are called Sacraments, His Grace (power) to live a new and better life. Some will claim today that Christianity has failed to do this. However, true and complete Christianity as a way of life, has never been seriously tried by the greater number of people, even some who claim to be Christians. Such a thing as a completely Christian Nation has never as yet existed in the world.

To get back to Jesus during his three years of public ministry, he assailed organised religion for its hypocrisy and spiritual pride. He attacked the 'Big business' of the Temple market. For this and because of the claim by his disciples that He was the Son of God, he earned the hatred of the leaders of organised religion.

The life of Jesus and His disciples and His teaching are the subject of the Four Gospels: Mark, Matthew, Luke, John. In these Gospels (Good News), we see Jesus, as a person of limitless confidence in God. He acted as an ordinary man, nonetheless as one who knew God personally. Living in a close relationship with God, he earned the saying from some people, 'No man ever spoke like this Man. What manner of man is he? Where does he get all this learning'? There are many points about the character of Jesus but I will mention just two here.

1. His friendliness: This drew people to Him, men, women and children. People from all walks of life, rich, poor, publicans. 'The common people received him gladly.' He understood them, He understood their needs. Jesus did not argue about God, quite naturally. He never attempted to define God, but He did let people believe that they could discover Him at any time and in any place.
2. His sympathy: The gospels abound with instances which show a deep compassion for people. He gave Himself to all who need

help. To the blind, the lepers, the sick, His response to their appeals was, 'I will'.

### SOME LESSONS FROM THE GOSPELS

Because our models of expression have changes during the centuries, the use of modern translations of the Bible might help in understanding more clearly the Gospel message.

The following are some of the sayings of Jesus Christ:

'Store up no treasures for yourselves on earth, where moth and rust corrodes, where thieves break in and steal, but store up treasures for yourself in heaven, where neither rust nor moth can corrode, and where thieves cannot break through and steal, for where your treasure is, there will be your heart also.'

Jesus taught that the highest good and the highest happiness does not come from material possessions but from an inner contentment of the soul which is developed by a belief in God, with prayer, worship and devotion, and particularly by meditation.

From St Matthew, Chapter 7 verses 1 and 2: 'Judge not and you will not judged, forgive and you will be forgiven, condemn not and you will not be condemned'. We are not able to know the complete circumstances of people, thus we are in no way at liberty to judge and condemn them. From St Matthew, Chapter 15 verse 11: 'it is not what enters a man's mouth that defiles him, it is what comes out of his mouth.' A man may eat with unwashed hands, but what we say comes from inside, we praise God with our mouths, then it follows that we ought not to utter obscenities, lies, abuse, or slander because these can come from an evil heart. Space does not permit any further writing, but I ask you to explore for yourselves the Gospels of the New Testament. You will not regret it.

To conclude these remarks, I would say this: no account of Christianity, however brief, would be complete should we fail to mention the great part that prayer plays in the life of the true Christian. Jesus himself said to pray often. The well-used and much-loved 'Lord's Prayer' was given by Jesus to his disciples in answer to their request, 'Lord, teach us to pray'. Critics of Christianity highlight its faults, bigotries, persecutions and failings; however, these are far outweighed by the wonderful contributions of many Christians to human welfare which have had a profound effect upon world civilisations.
