Support for the Strategic Plan

The Association is working to the Strategic Plan set for the 6 years 2023-2028. This Plan has been embraced by our membership and the Branch Executive Committee. We regularly review progress with respect to the 4 pillars and we do everything necessary to provide support to the Chief Commissioner and the organisation in relation to that Plan. The 4 pillars are: Member Experience, People and Culture, Sustainability and Operations.

Government Support

The organisation has been successful in receiving Queensland Government support and that assistance has not only resulted in the \$1M to provide much needed support to Groups around maintenance of their buildings, but also \$700K to support the Jamboree in Maryborough at the beginning of 2025. The support is not only acknowledged but is greatly appreciated. Please be assured that we continue to work with Government on all levels to obtain support for the delivery of our program. Our interactions with various Local Government authorities have also been positive and continue to be developed.

Insurance, Risk Management, Redress and Civil Claims

Insurance remains the largest expense to the operation of Scouts Queensland and the premiums for the next 12 months have, as expected, continued to rise. Insurance remains a large issue given the lack of insurers in the field and the appetite of underwriters in relation to risk. The risk profile of our organisation is low given our policies, training and systems. Further Government involvement in this area has been flagged and will be pursued. Obviously, we need at all times to be vigilant in relation to complying with our risk management policies so as not to expose the organisation to claims.

The National Redress Scheme continues and claims are being processed. These claims are being met from within the resources of the organisation, although a considerable amount of work has to be undertaken to properly manage cash flow moving forward. Sadly, this has resulted in the organisation having to liquidate assets to meet the payments required under the Scheme. The Branch Executive Committee remains confident we can effectively keep ahead of the curve in relation to these payments. One outlier, is exposure to civil litigation and in that regard the potential risks to the Association are significant. The Branch Executive Committee continues to monitor our exposure in this area.

In conclusion, I would like to again reiterate my thanks to the thousands of volunteers who support the implementation of our Youth Program across this State. It is important however, that I recognise the Chief Commissioner, Mr Geoff Doo and his team for the careful and diligent application that they apply to their roles. Please be assured that there is absolute commitment by Geoff and his team to succeed in our delivery of the Strategic Plan. I would also like to thank members of the Branch Executive Committee for their dedicated service and application to their role as members of the Executive and their careful review and contribution to the matters that form part of our agenda each month.

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MESSAGE FROM THE

CHIEF COMMISSIONER

It is surprising how quickly a year goes by!

At this time, it is important to reflect on the year past whilst also keeping an eye on the year ahead. Our Strategic Plan 2023-2028 has been our focus over the last year as we continue to "Empower young people to their full potential through our Youth Program."

We have been fortunate that over 13,000 young people have experienced, participated in and grown through their involvement in Scouting over 2023/24. The impact that these young people have in their local communities' has been immense, with a clear demonstration that "Scouting delivers to our communities resilient young people who have gained leadership experience, are physically active and care for others."

We did see a reduction in youth membership as of 31 March 2024 down 6%, the first time in over 10 years and we believe this reflects cost of living and a slow return from the COVID bubble. It also highlights the opportunity for Scouting to ensure our program is Adventurous, Fun, Challenging and Inclusive.

Over this year we have seen wonderful achievements through our Strategic Plan:

Uplift in the use of Scouts I Terrain to 81%.

AJ2025 funding of \$700K secured from the Queensland Government.

\$1M funding from the Queensland Government budget in 2023/24 to support infrastructure projects through to June 2025.

Incident Reporting Form and Child Safety Incident Reporting Form are now online.

Uplift in Adult Recognition Award Nominations by 10% to 131.

Formosa Scout Group initiated.

Branch Commissioner (Child Safety) appointed.

Uplift in number of VET Qualifications for members to 109.

Continued employment opportunities through the Program Development Team.

Recognition across Queensland of Members through Community / Volunteer Awards.

Space2Co pilot launched.

113 Formations have Strategic Plans in place.

Document Hierarchy continues to be implemented.

Launch of Digital Online Branch Calendar.

Our opportunities to improve include:

- Membership 8,314 as of 31 March reduction of 6% year on year.
- Approval to sponsor some of our events remains a work in progress.
- Seeking to reduce our overall resource usage water, energy, waste and emissions.
- Stronger focus on Sustainable Development Goals through our Youth Program.

MESSAGE FROM THE

HONORARY TREASURER

The 2023/24 financial year surplus (before income tax) of \$1.497M is a significant turnaround from the previous years loss of (\$1.503M). This does not reflect any substantial change in our core operations, rather the material impact of asset sales (land & buildings, net gain of \$1.643M) and non-cash accounting adjustments such as changes in market value of our financial investments (unrealised gain of \$568K). Operational revenues such as membership, facility and activity fees, dividends, training and camping fees remain stable (\$4.724M in 2022/23 cf \$5.051M in 2023/24).

Insurance proceeds of \$1.337M was also recognised in this year's accounts and as per last year, will be utilised to repair flood damage and provide greater flood resilience for future events. Despite continuing cost increases, controllable operational costs continue to be well managed. Excluding legal and insurance costs, operating expenditure for 2023/24 was \$4.018M, an increase of 2.88% from 2022/23 expenditure.






Our Facilities and Risk team, led by Andrew Morgan, has worked tirelessly with many Groups over the last 12 months to support flood recovery works, building maintenance activities, local government approvals, lease renewals, contributions to grant applications, as well as leading the enormous task of ensuring we have appropriate insurances in place to mitigate risk where possible. Andrew's team has also been instrumental in establishing our Scouts Queensland Facility Improvement Fund to allocate the State Government's generous grant of \$1M. This program is now well underway.

I would also like to thank our Brand and Sponsorship team. It is so important that the Scouts brand acknowledges our deep history while also remaining fresh and well-positioned in a highly competitive marketplace. Thanks to our team and in collaboration with you all, our social media presence continues to grow, new signage is gradually being rolled out across Scouting facilities and I think you will all agree that our promotional materials are vibrant and professional.

Our Honorary Treasurer, Sam Nicolosi, has indicated that our organisation's financial performance and governance remain sound. Our Finance Team, under Sam's guidance, has worked tirelessly to ensure that, as an organisation, we are meeting our financial governance obligations. Every dollar counts and one of my priorities has been to ensure our expenditure is purposeful and not wasteful. We also have an eye on the future to ensure the long-term financial sustainability of our organisation. The Finance team's diligent work has been instrumental in maintaining our financial stability.

However, I also invite you to envision the future and consider how we can collaborate to ensure Scouting continues to make a significant and impactful contribution, supporting young people in our communities.





The Member Experience portfolio encompasses Youth Program, Major Events and Specialist Activities. Member Experience is a large team with a diverse range of skills which are leveraged to ensure the best Scouting programs are delivered. It is no secret that when we provide great experiences, our

members stay and we see not only retention but great growth. This was the first year of the new structure bringing all three teams together under the Member Experience banner. This has provided the opportunity for the teams to support one another delivering a vibrant and relevant Youth Program, running awesome major events and providing fantastic opportunities to experience specialist activities.

Scout Year 2023/24 key headlines:

The Member Experience function was established during 2023, to align with the Branch Strategy. As a result, 2023 was a year of renewal in the Branch Youth Program Team with many new appointments. We now have all sections actively represented and supported with a Branch Commissioner and Branch Adviser and new roles in Program Support, Program Technology and Program Insights established. Importantly the Branch Youth Council has been re-invigorated and kicked off 2023 with several exciting new projects established.

Milestone Awards

A youth member is awarded a "Milestone" achievement in recognition of their active involvement in the diverse Scouting Program. It considers their participation, assisting and leading Scouting activities across the different Challenge Areas of Creative, Outdoors, Community and Personal Growth. The higher Milestone levels require and recognise the development of leadership skills in our youth members as they lead activities.

Outdoor Adventure Skills (OAS)

An Outdoor Adventure Skill stage is awarded when a youth member has demonstrated they have learnt a particular set of skills to one of nine stages in one of the nine different OAS streams of Bushwalking, Bushcraft, Camping, Cycling, Alpine, Vertical, Paddling, Boating and Aquatics.

It is worth noting that Scouts | Terrain represents about 40% of groups achievements, so there will be significantly more achievements awarded than the numbers above.





Major Events serve several important purposes. They provide development opportunities for youth members and allow participants to come together in large groups, fostering fun and fellowship. A Major Event also offers a unique opportunity to contribute to the development of knowledge, skills and capabilities in young people.

The 2023/24 Scouting year has seen Major Events come back in force.

LEAP23 - This inaugural event held from 29 June to 4 July, set out with a clear set of objectives focussed on Leadership, Empowerment, Adventure and Patrol. Aiming to provide Scouts and Venturer Scouts with a state-level camp experience, with a goal of offering participants a large event in preparation for AJ2025, testing Patrol Leaders in a controlled environment with Jamboree-like expectations and highlighting the diverse experiences and adventures that Scouting offers.

The events were held at two locations: Baden-Powell Park in Samford and Tarmaroo Campsite in Townsville. The camp experience was designed to be consistent across both sites, ensuring that outcomes were uniform regardless of the chosen location. Over 480 members attended these 2 events.

Brisbane Gang Show - Performed at the Draney Theatre Ashgrove during the June 2023 School Holidays, this being the 72nd consecutive season of the show.

The season featured over 100 youth members on stage and over 100 support team members. The show, "Forward to Fame," was set in a performing arts school where young people with big dreams navigate the highs and lows of their journey, culminating in an end-of-year showcase. The show could not run without the hard work and dedication of so many people.

Cuboree23 - Our 7th Cuboree provided an adventurous experience for Cub Scouts aged 9 to 11 years offering five nights under canvas and away from home. This year, it was held from 17-22 September at Maryborough Showgrounds and Equestrian Park. The event utilised the showgrounds for camping, dining, health and well-being activities. Maryborough's Queens Park, Town Centre and Hervey Bay hosted two off-site activities.

The purpose of Cuboree23 was to offer a state-wide Scouting adventure that emphasised the fundamentals of Scouting through the Youth Program, fostering self-reliance, self-empowerment and self-motivation.

Agoonoree - In it's 42nd year, the Camp was held at Baden-Powell Park, Samford between 16-22 September. Agoonoree offers the opportunity for children with additional needs, external to the Scouting/Girl Guiding community, the chance to experience the joy and excitement of Scouting and Girl Guiding activities. 282 members of Scouting along with 60 Girl Guides participated in Agoonoree and supported 65 guests during the week-long camp.




International - As well as the Branch run events members from Queensland also had the opportunity to travel to Interstate and International Events with over 300 International Scouting travel experiences including:

- 25th World Scout Jamboree in Korea 136 members attended in August 2023.
- 23rd New Zealand Jamboree 72 members attended in January 2024.
- Venture 24 55 members attended in January 2024 held in Victoria with expeditions undertaken in Fiji, New Zealand and Queensland.













Adventurous Activities - The Team continues to support many activities at Branch, Region and District level so that members can challenge themselves and enjoy the outdoors. The annual mountain bike "XXX" camp at Karingal Campsite and Activity Centre and Sea Kayaking School at Yeppoon were again very successful. The Outdoor Adventure Skills (OAS) camp was jam packed with activities and numerous OAS skills completed. The regular paddling days at Karingal continue to be popular with 60 participants enjoying each activity day. This year a scuba camp was held at Stradbroke Island and was enjoyed by the attendees.

Performing Arts - The combined Scout Show Committee met regularly across the year and supported a number of Scout Show productions – Brisbane Gang Show, Rochedale Revue, Wonargo Revue and Darling Downs Revue. These activities are run locally by Groups/Districts and Regions and provide an opportunity for youth members to participate in performing arts at a local level. The Performing Arts team continue to provide and deliver unit-based programs for Groups to access.

Heritage - The Team continues to receive many donations of Scouting memorabilia which is catalogued and stored. The Team has spent a significant amount of time over the last year refurbishing the museum at Baden-Powell Park, Samford, with a goal of updating the display areas and making for a better member experience. The recording of our history remains a critical part of our ethos and a dedicated team of volunteers continue to support this important work. The Team also supports the Youth Program through attendance at many Branch/Region and District events.

Environment - The Team continues to work tirelessly in running educational programs from the Eprapah Environmental Centre. The program allows youth members to achieve badges and Leaders to gain knowledge and skills in running activities to include environmental themes in their Unit programs.

Air Activities - The Air Activities base at Cuboree in Maryborough in September allowed over 700 Cub Scouts to experience a flight. This program required a significant amount of work and coordination with the relevant authorities to ensure the activity base was a success. The Team also continue to provide Air Activities for sections at Archerfield Airport.

STEM - During the year the Team supported a number of major events including LEAP23, Cuboree and Scouting on the Green.

Spirituality - The Team works closely with the Youth Program team in the delivery of program initiatives to support the growth and development of youth members in creating and supporting spiritual awareness.

The Dick & Pip Smith Leadership Through Adventure Fund (LTAF) was established with Scouts Australia to support young people in developing leadership skills through responsible risk-taking adventures. Youth members can apply for financial assistance based on their planned adventures. The fund encourages members to initiate adventures, with approval and fine-tuning occurring at the Scout Group and Branch level. In Queensland 113 youth members participated in patrol based adventures and secured funding of \$93,000 during 2023/24.





Adult Recognition Awards

This includes 64 new appointments and 47 re-appointments in the 2023/24 Scouting year (81 ongoing - appointments are for 2 years).

Adult Training and Development

Between 1 April 2023 and 31 March 2024 we issued 80 Wood Badges.

In the last Scouting year, 8 '60MinutesOf' sessions were available for delivery at District/Region Training Meetings to help our Adult Leaders build and maintain their skills. This is part of a commitment to ongoing development for our existing volunteers (in addition to upskilling new volunteers).

Youth Participation in Committees

Queensland Branch provided the Under 30's representative on the National Adults in Scouting Committee for the last year. We have a youth representative on interview panels for roles at Region/Branch level and our Branch Youth Council was reconstituted earlier this year and works as a representative body for our youth members. Queensland Branch Rover Council continues to lead and support Rover Scouts across Queensland.

Diversity and Inclusion

The Team delivered 3 'Supporting Gender Diverse Youth in Scouting' workshops and participated in the Brisbane Pride March and Moreton Bay Pridefest. The Team also oversaw the adoption of Scouts Australia guides / materials on 'Supporting Neurodiverse Adult and Youth Members' and these are available to members on the Key Resources page of the Scouts Australia website.

SUSTAINABILITY

The Branch Executive Committee, in conjunction with the Chief Commissioner, continue to review assets to identify opportunities for sale where there is no effective Scout Program being provided, as a means of continuing to meet our civil and redress obligations.

In this year we have seen the sale of the following properties:

Salisbury Scout Den

Wooroolinn Scout Den

We have commenced a review of our energy usage, from both a cost and provider perspective to understand the current state of play. This may provide opportunities for cost reduction, through a review of our buying power.

The Sustainable Development Goals (SDG's) remain a focus of our Youth Program delivered at a local level. Scouting's involvement at community events such as Clean Up Australia Day and Local Bushcare Groups, all have a strong focus on our environment and allow our members to contribute locally.

The Queensland Government Infrastructure Project, with \$1M of funding. This has seen Scouts Queensland approve 17 projects across our Branch focussed on the main objectives of the project, namely accessibility, stronger community use through better facilities, improved disability access and future proofing those facilities. This funding has been allocated over the budget years 2024 and 2025 and we expect in the coming year to deliver against most of these projects.

A focus on improved facilities at our Branch managed campsites has seen strong growth in the use of these campsites, importantly by our members in the first instance, but also by members of the community. This provides a strong revenue line for the Branch and as it grows and develops allows for reinvestment in these facilities.

The equipment store at Baden-Powell Park has seen an increase in revenue through stronger hire arrangements both internally and externally. An additional revenue line for the Branch, which again allows for reinvestment in equipment to support major events.

OPERATIONS



Within the Operations portfolio there has been a continued focus on the implementation of our Document Hierarchy, with 7 policies approved by Branch Executive Committee, along with 15 standards. This process is ongoing as we continue to migrate our Queensland Branch Scouting Instructions (QBSI) to the new Document Hierarchy.

Our Enterprise Risk Management Committee is methodically working through the Enterprise Risk Register to update the register to better reflect 'Enterprise Risks', whilst our Operational Risk Management Committee looks monthly at incident reports to highlight issues that have, or could have, a program impact. These are communicated to the Branch via the Chief's Newsletter and may lead to a change in policy or procedure.

Internally we continue to review process and procedures to identify opportunities to be more efficient. The results of our Stop Start Continue exercise across various portfolios is in varying stages of implementation.



YOUTH PEAK AWARDS

Scouting Peak Awards represent a high level of achievement and effort from our youth members. To earn their Peak Award, youth members in each section must complete a number of age-appropriate development activities including outdoor adventures, community involvement, leadership and personal growth. Over the last 12 months a total of 590 peak awards were achieved.

VOLUNTEERS

The delivery of the Scouting Program to young people in Queensland would not be possible without the unwavering commitment, selfless contribution and tireless efforts of our volunteers. Over 4,000 volunteers support the delivery of the Scouting program in Queensland each year. Many have trained to become Group Leaders, Section Leaders and Specialist Activity Leaders, while others bring their personal skills to provide Group, District, Region and State support in roles such as Chair, Secretaries and Treasurers.

Volunteering is not restricted to roles with formal appointments, as we could not function without supporters who help with fundraising and events, participation in landcare and maintenance activities and attendance at camps and major events. In 2023/24, we estimate our volunteers contributed in excess of 1M volunteer hours, which equates to \$47M per annum.

Like other not-for-profit organisations, we continue to face the challenge of retaining and attracting new volunteers. By understanding the barriers to volunteering, we hope to adapt to offer more flexible opportunities and ensure our volunteers are supported. People are motivated to volunteer for enjoyment, to be active and to help others, all of which can be achieved through Scouting.

Volunteering not only benefits our youth members, but research also demonstrates that people who volunteer, experience improved mental wellbeing. Through Scouting, adults can learn new skills, attain qualifications, make friends and connections and be physically active, all while contributing to the development and improved welfare of young people.

We thank all our dedicated volunteers, without whom we could not deliver the Scouting program.

Scouts Queensland has been awarded a total of \$862,093 towards 161 projects for our Scouting Formations from April 2023 - March 2024.

Volunteers from 88 Formations including Districts and Regions have given their time to support the delivery of wonderful outcomes for their communities. Youth members have been able to continue to benefit from the Scout Program with projects such as event funding support, activity equipment, electrical upgrades, portable shade sails, leader training and membership fee support, audio visual and IT equipment, trailers, flags and advertising materials, watercraft, safety equipment, building and grounds maintenance and whitegoods.

In addition, the organisation has also been awarded an additional \$1M in the Queensland Government Budget through the Department of Tourism, Innovation and Sport, for our Priority Infrastructure Projects. This funding has been allocated towards the completion of 17 Facility Improvement projects across the state over a 2-year period.

The Australian Jamboree AJ2025, hosted in Maryborough in January 2025, will be delivered by a team of dedicated Queensland Scouting Volunteers. This event has received \$700K from the Queensland Government acting through the Department of the Premier and Cabinet. The funding has been awarded to support youth and volunteers at this event through equipment supply, event setup, volunteer training, sustainability infrastructure and an educational campaign to raise awareness and promote sustainable practices.
